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F111 in combat


tism of fire came in March 1968 when six F111As of the 428th Tactical Fighter Squadron deployed from Nellis Air Force Base in Nevada to bomb North Vietnam.

The aircraft were deployed for 'combat evaluation' codenamed Operation Lancer Operating from Takhli Air Base in Thailand the first combat mission was a dismal failure. Three of the six F111s groundaborted with equipment failures and a fourth airaborted with an Electronic Counter Measures failure. The fifth aircraft crashed and the sixth had to divert to a secondary target.

After this first combat mission the five F111s were grounded and their systems checked on training routes in Thailand before resum: ing combat mission

The first missions were medium altitude bomb ing of the passes just over the North Vietnam border, but the tactics soon changed to the un-escorted, 'flying alona' missions that are the F111's forte. These tactics ensured a high level of security and the vital element of surprise when the F111 arrived at low-level over the target and dropped its bombs.

In its first month in mis sions into North Vietnam, three of the six aircraft had crashed. Even so, the F111 proved that it had unique capabilities unmatched by contemporary strike

aircraft. Its capability to operate a low-level, at night and in poor weather conditions was its best defence agains(anti-aircraft fira. By the reacted to the bombing

run the F111 was gone The remaining three from Thailand afte flying a mere 55 missions. None of the crashed aircraft had been shot down -- the likely cause being the failure of a weld in the left taiipiane which caused the aircraft to suddenly roll and pitch

In the early 1970s, increased use of surface to air missiles, antiaircraft artillery and improved radar technology caused heavy losses in American aircraft. In September 1972, the Thailand with the 429th and 430th Fighter Squadrons The 48 aircraft flew over

4000 missions over North Vietnam at low: level using Terrain Foi iowing Radar tactics.
The F111s established a reputation for serviceability, survivability and getting bombs on target during these last fiva months of the Vietnam

☐ The Libyan Raid and The Gulf War

In April 1968, F111s from bases in Britain carried out a daring precision air strike against five terrorist targets in the heartland of Libva.

Loaded with laser guided bombs, the 18 strike F111s and three

'Raven' electronic jamming aircraft travelled via the Mediterranean See to avoid flying the direct route over France and Spain. These countries had denied permission for overflights

Airborne tanker aircraft air-refuelled the F111s four times enroute to Near Libya. coastline the attack force split into three groups of six F111s and descended to about 300 feet above ground level for their bombing runs. The F111s hit their targets around 2am with devastating effect. All targets were either destroyed or sustained major damage. One F111 was iost perhaps hit by around fire.

In just 11 minutes the F111s had delivered their weapons on target



with complete surprise and encountered minimal anti-aircraft defence. The F111s escaped as quickly as they had arrived, flying north to rendezvous with their tankers before returning to their home bases at RAF Lakenheath and RAF Upper Heyford.

The F111s were airborne for a total of 15 hours and carried out the first 'surgical' strike against military targets. This mission was a torerunner to the F111's role in a much bigger battle -- the Gulf War.

Two decades after its introduction to combat the F111 again played a major part in one of the most decisive and spectacular applications of air power -- coordinated air strikes against targets in Iraq.

Every night, millions of television viewers around the world witnessed the precision air strikes against targets that were almost defen-

celess against the awesome capability of aircraft such as the F111.

During this short but lethal tour of duty, the F111 joined with Allied aircraft to destroy the military capability of Sadam Hussein. In doing so, it silenced its critics forever.



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City mourns RAAF crew



AN eyewitness to an F-111 crash at Guyra in northern New South Wales on Monday night saw the plane explode in the air.

The pilot, Flight Lieutenant Jeremy McNess, 26, of Yamanto, and navigator Flight Lieutenant Mark Cairns-Cowan, 28, of Karana Downs, were killed when their F-111 crashed about 7.15pm.

Leigh Ramage said yesterday she and her husband and 16-year-old daughter were looking out windows of their farmhouse, about 2km from the crash site, and saw the F-111 explode.

She was sure the aircraft exploded in the air because a hill between the house and the site would have obscured their view if it had exploded on impact with the ground.

Mrs Ramage said her daughter Jenni happened to look out the window and called out "that plane's on fire, it's going to crash."

She and her husband ran to the windows and saw the explosion about eight seconds later. She said the blast rocked the house like a bomb.

The F-111 was one of three aircraft from the 82, Wing's One Squadron — the air force's premier strike squadron — taking part in a routine low-level night training exercise.

Strike Reconnaissance Group commanding officer Air Commodore Dave Rogers yesterday described the crewmen as two of the brightest young officers in the squadron.

He told a media conference at Strike Reconnaissance Group headquarters at Amberley that F-111s would not fly yesterday and today as a mark of respect, but there was no reason to ground the two F-111 squadrons.

The crash is the seventh since the aircraft officially entered service in 1973. Eight crewmen have died in four of the accidents.

Air Commodore Rogers said the attrition rate was within acceptable limits, although it was mentally difficult to lose personnel or aircraft.

He said the loss of the crew struck at the heart of the RAAF.


"We feel the loss very deeply. Everyone on the base is trying to come to grips with it."

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

Defence Buys F-111G rerest et Bargain-Basement Prices



he recently-announced agreement by the Commonwealth Government to purchase fifteen F-111G long-range strike aircraft from the United States has been a long, controversial and complicated exercise for Defence.

The cost breakdown of each aircraft is \$A5.1 million each without spares or modifications.

The F-111G aircraft essentially became available as result of the proposed U.S. cuts in defence spending and hence a 25 per cent reduction of defence capability and equipment, set to take effect by 1995-96. When these reductions are realised and implemented by the USAF, there will be approximately 1000 modernised aircraft surplus to USAF requirements. (The price being paid per aircraft is substantially less than the \$A14 million paid for Australia's first F-111 purchase in 1973.)

The Minister for Defence, Senator Robert Ray's announcement said in part, "following my statement to Parliament on 15 October 1992, the options for acquisition of additional aircraft had been carefully examined. It has been concluded that the F-111 G aircraft represented the most cost-effective solution."

The minister added that the capital cost was quoted by the Department as \$A78 million and will be supplemented to the Defence budget by the Government.

An estimated \$68 million will be

spent in the future on additional

spares and minor modifications to ensure the long term viability of the aircraft.

Opposition query Funding for Purchase

The Minister's parliamentary announcement on the potential purchase in October 1992 raised opposition hackles and led to some very heated exchanges between the two offices. Alexander Downer, the then Shadow Defence spokesman, debunked the purchase as a political stunt leading into the December election that never came.

Later releases from the opposition stated that the project could cost as much as \$A400 million, with avionics upgrades and, "set back rational defence planning for the rest of the decade." (At the time there was no clear or definitive statement as to which F-111 model was being purchased.)

Opposition attacks on the decision continue to focus on the cost of the purchase at a time when Australia's economy is sluggish and budget deficit and unemployment are correspondingly high.

Avionics upgrade Sways Final Choice

One reason the department claims they ultimately settled on the F-111Gs was because the expensive avionics upgrade was already completed. Present estimates from the RAAF put the cost of the avionics upgrade of the existing F-111Cs at \$A540 million over the next three years, involving 21 aircraft. (One aircraft is in the US at present being upgraded as a model.)

Some concerns at the time (October/November 1992) were also raised privately by sections of the RAAF as to the viability of the purchase and whether the purchase was realistically sustainable financially and technically. Secondhand aircraft, they noted, may not be such a good deal taking into consideration their flying hours and the reliability of documentation and maintenance records.


On the other side of the fence, engineers involved with F-111 models say that the 'airframes' of this style of aircraft have one of the longest life expectancies of any aircraft flying, approximately 10,000 flying hours.

It was probably with some satisfaction that the Minister's office confirmed that delivery crews from RAAF will begin transporting the planes from the U.S., and will begin arriving at Amberley as early as August 1993, with delivery expected to be completed by January 1994.

Boost for 501 Wing

When all modifications and updates are completed to all aircraft, the 501 wing strength will have an 'active' level of 22 aircraft. Some of the 'new' F-111Gs will be stored and the F-111Cs will be incorporated into the wing through overhaul and maintenance schedules.

The two Commercial Support Program Tier 1 activities at



Amberley, F-111 Maintenance and F-111 Engines had already built in a provision for expanded service provision in the event of a purchase agreement being completed, and although the engines in the F-111C's differ from the F-111G's the RAAF believes the new aircraft will be absorbed into CSP without any major adjustments. This contract is scheduled for announcement in August.

Details of this crucial next step to be taken by RAAF, involving the engines upgrade and/or replacement for the existing F-111Cs, is yet to be announced. The present engines are no longer supportable in the long term, and changes will have to made, however upgrades on the present will not make them compatible with the engines of the newly-purchased F-111G's. The prospect of providing for two engine types in similar aircraft will take some careful logistical coordination.

Spares Procedures 'not yet finalised'

The provision and warehousing of spares procedures for the F-111 G's has not been finalised. The RAAF will not release details at this time as to how supply and support will be arranged for the aircraft, as planning is not yet complete. however RAAF personnel are of the opinion that with the many aircraft retirements in the US, there should be a large and long availability of spares at auction and through other purchase sources.

One option believed to be under consideration is that RAAF would purchase the spares as soon as is practicably possible. It therefore follows that it would not matter who wins the support contracts. If the inhouse options are taken the spares would already be in place, or, if the commercial route is taken, the cost of delivery would not be as potentially severe, introducing guaranteed cost savings for RAAF

and potential contractors. It is also felt that this would also limit the number of competing interests for spares and defuse some potential bidding 'wars'.

Risk of Regional 'misunderstandings'

There were political implications and regional perceptions to be considered in making the decision to purchase, some of which had the potential to cause problems for Australian relations in the region.

These concerns first surfaced via the Indonesian ambassador Sabam Siagian, who at the time of the October announcement, voiced concerns that his country was not told of the purchase before Senator Ray made the announcement, a fairly representative sentiment of some other near neighbours. This perceived lack of sensitivity to others in the region, or just plain bad timing concerning the mechanics of the announcement, appear to have been overcome.

Senator Ray has always taken the position that the new F-111G's were purchased primarily to extend Australia's 'F-111 age' old and new, past the year 2020.

This sentiment was underlined in a recent interview given by Air Commodore Dave Rogers, Commander of the Strike/Reconnaissance Group, 501 Wing at Amberley. He said, "The reason for buying the new planes was purely

to buy attrition to enable us to keep the fleet going. We do need some attrition aeroplanes."

The ADF and department's continuing - and expanding - efforts in joint exercises, technical and staff exchanges, and the concerted export drive into the South East Asian region for defence industries and technologies are all linked to Australia's growing defence commitment to the region, and have gone a long way to putting the purchase into perspective.

It is obvious the Minister is not going to risk any future 'misunder-standings', as can been seen by his recent consulting agenda on a visit to S.E. Asia last month. Following announcements of potential patrol vessel sales to Malaysia and possibly Indonesia soon began to appear.

The department is presently formulating an agenda for an industry/defence deputation to visit the region before year's end, keeping the dialogue in the region open and informative on both strategic and industry matters.

Australia's development as a significant voice on regional defence, industry and strategic matters is on track in an increasingly convoluted market place. It will take a sustained agenda from both Australian Industry and the Department to maintain the growth curve, especially in the light of the growing defence expenditure cuts throughout the world, providing a defence buyers' bonanza.

A senior ADF member cautioned last week, "that no matter what great deals are going around now or in the future, they still have to fit with our needs and capabilities before we purchase. Price is not the sole criteria, also we won't be buying anything unless it can be supported to a large extent by the ADF and Australian Industry, with a large degree of independence from outside.

"Just because it's cheap and good, that does not mean we need it."

The spokesman was referring to the speculation on the 40 Cobra Helicopter purchase. This was an unsolicited approach from the U.S. to Defence and will involve extensive examination before a decision is reached.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. <u>Tie-Line and DNATS Facilities.</u> Tie-Line and Dnats facilities are available to most Defence Establishments. Whereover possible subscribers are requested to use these facilities in preference to STD.
- 2. Faults. Telephone faults are to be reported to the Switchboard Supervisor on Ext 2223. However, should a fault develop in an extension that users a Telecom extension cord, that fault is to be reported to PABX and Landlines Services on Ext 2528 or 3215. Private telephone equipment ie. telephone handsets, extension cords etc, connected to the Base PABX System is forbidden. Any faults reported which are found to be caused by private equipment will result in Telecom charging RAAF a service fee for incorrect call-out. Action will be taken to recover the amount of the fee from the person or persons responsible for connection of non-approved equipment.
- 3. <u>Complaints.</u> Any complaints concerning delays of operation of the Switchboard are to be made to the Switchboard Supervisor on Ext 2223 and not the operators.
- 4. <u>Installations and Alterations to the Extension.</u> All requests for alterations and /or installations should be made to the OIC GROUND ELECTRONIC SERVICES through Unit representatives by Minute.
- 5. Reverse Charge Calls. RAAF Amberley Switchboard Operators may accept incoming reverse charge telephone calls reporting aircraft accidents, aircraft incidents or emergencies involving RAAF personnel or their dependants. No other reverse charge calls are to be accepted on any Base extension in accordance with DI(AF)OPS 8-10. Personnel may lodge a reverse charge call providing no costs are incurred by the RAAF. Reverse charge calls may be also made from pay phones located throughout the Base.
- 6. <u>Amendments to the Base Telephone Directory.</u> Users requiring amendments to the Base Telephone Directory are to forward them in writing to the OIC GES.
- 7. <u>PABX Out of Bounds.</u> The PABX is out of bounds to all ranks, except for those authorised entryby the Officer Commanding, 301 Air Base Wing.
- 8. <u>Call Date Recording.</u> The computerised telephone switch equipment records ALL appliciable information (ie. calling extension number, called number, time of day, duration, call cost, call transfers etc.) on originated calls. Call records will be routinely examined to check for instances of phone abuse. Any extension user experiencing nuisance or unwanted calls contact the OIC GES so the source of the calls if possible can be traced.
- 9. <u>Telephone Calls Official.</u> Official outgoing calls are normally processed through the Base Switchboard. Those appointees with a direct dialling facility should dial 'O', wait for dial tone and then dial the required number. This facility is for official calls only.

- 10. <u>Telecards</u> Telecom Telecard System is te only means of initiating private telephone calls from RAAF Amberley. Abbreviated dial numbers are programmed to allow access to the Telecard System from Base extensions.
 - a. 40199 provides access to the automatic Telecard Service (1818 Service).
- b. 40198 provides access to the Telecard Operator for operator assisted calls (these calls are charged a higher rate than non operator assisted calls).

Applications for Telecard are available from PABX and Landlines Services at COMMCEN.

- 11. <u>Public Telephones.</u> Public Telephones are located in various areas throughout the Base. Locations are:
 - a. 501WG; (west)
 - b. 501WG; (east)
 - c. 38SQN;
 - d. Airmovements Section;
 - e. Transit Quarters; (block 681)
 - f. Base Canteen;
 - g. Ground Electronic Maintenance; (near BLDG 131-132)
 - h. Officers Mess;
 - i. Post Office;
 - j. Sergeants Mess;
 - k. Two Public Phones near Airmens Mess; and
 - I. Front Gate.
- 12. <u>Telephone Equipment.</u> All Telephone Equipment is the property of RAAF and under no circumstances is the equipment to be tampered with, without approval fro theOIC GES.

EXTENSION USERS GUIDE

- 1. Facilities Provided by the Telephone System. The Siemens Telephone System provides two types of facilities, those related to access control, and other specifically intended for the convenience of users. The access control facilities are generally related to the expenditure control, and determine which extensions gain off-base access, how often, and how far. The controls applied for the convenience of each extension user are specified by RAAF policy. These can only be varied by a formal submission to OIC GES by minute.
- 2. Access Control Facilities.
- a. <u>Classes of Service</u>. There are four classes of services allocated to individual telephone extensions. These are:
- (1) <u>COS 0.</u> Extensions with this Class of Service cannot be in-dialled and have no off base access (even with switchboard).
- (2) <u>COS 1.</u> Off base calls are available only with operator assistance. In-dialling is permitted but may be barred to chosen extensions by another extension.
- (3) COS 2. Local area called (ie. Amberley/Brisbane) may be dialled directly.
- (4) COS 3. Not used.
- (5) COS 4. STD access.

Note: When COS is allocated to an extension, that extension automatically qualifies for all COSs in the following paragraphs, 3-19 inclusive.

- 3. <u>Abbreviated Code Calling. (ACC).</u> This method of dialling is the only way in which the COS allocated to each extension may be exceeded. Provided the chosen number is authorised for use by an extension, that extension may gain access to ACC by the following means:
- a. Lift handset.
- b. Await dial tone.
- c. Dial 4.
- d. Dial the access code chosen from the appropriate group. The telephone system will then automatically dial the pre-programmed telephone number for the location chosen from the ACC index.

4. <u>Downgrade of Class of Service (COS)</u>. The PABX provides controlled use of COS2 or greater extension, (including married quarter extensions) by allowing extension users to personally change the access levels to COS1. This achieved with the use of a Personal Code Number. Personal codes for STD subscribers are strictly controlled and can be obtained by PABX and Landlines Services. Personnel will by required to show identification cards when collecting their Personal Code number. Personal codes for local subscribers are also strictly controlled but, can be obtained by contacting PABX and Landlines Services with extension user details. Users are advised that misuse of these extensions is the responsibility of the member having signed for the personal code. Therefore, if an extension is to be unattended for a period of time, personnel are advised to downgrade their extension to COS1. During standdown the Switchboard Operator will downgrade all COS2 or greater extensions with the exception of married quarters and specially selected extensions. The following are the precedures for changing access levels:

a. During Working Hours:

- (1) Dowgrade (remove Access)
 - (a) Rotary Dial/Push Button: 118 Special Dial Tone Personal Code Special Dial Tone Hang up.
 - (b) Comfortset: 18 Special Dial Tone Personal Code Special Dial Tone- Hang up.
- (2) Upgrade (regain Access)
 - (a) Rotary Dial/Push Button: 1018 Personal Code Hang up.
 - (b) Comfortset: #18 Personal Code Hang up.
- b. During Standdown:
 - (1) Upgrade (regain Access)
 - (a) Rotary dial/Push Button: 1018
 - (b) Comfortset: *18 Personal Code Hang up.

After this procedure is carried out then access levels can be downgraded and upgraded using the procedure described for during working hours.

5. <u>Convenient Facilities.</u> All the normal guidelines relate to the use of Rotary dial (normal) handsets. For other forms of handsets, these instructions should be used for guidance, but also see the applicable user hand books distrubuted at the time of commissioning of the new system for full details.

- 6. <u>Transfer Facilities.</u> The following are the different transfer facilities available to extension users:
- a. To hold a call while consulting another extension on base:
 - (1) Press the Facility button (or recall on T200):
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial wanted extension number and make your enquiry;
 - (4) Press Facility button (or recall and # on T200).
- b. To transfer a call to another extension on the base (whether you received or made the call, and regardless of whether it is an on or off base call):
 - (1) Press Facility button (or recall on T200),
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial wanted extension;
 - (4) Introduce the call to the person accepting the transfer;
 - (5) Replace handset.
- c. To transfer an Off-Base call to the Switchboard:
 - (1) Press the Facility button (or recall on T200);
 - (2) Replace the handset.
- d. To speak to the Operator before transferring an Off-Base call:
 - (1) Press the Facility button (or recall on T200);
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 9;
 - (4) Speak to the Operator;
 - (5) Replace the handset.
- 7. Authorised extensions can store the last Off-Base number dialled (eg. when the called party is busy, fails to answer, or is to be rung again) by dialling a code. That number can then be redialled at any time by selecting the Automatke Redialling facility.

- a. To store a dialled Off-Base number for subsequent redialling:
 - (1) Press the Facility button;
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 16, receive position acknowledgment tone;
 - (4) Replace handset.

The last telephone number dialled has been stored for reuse. The stored number can be redialled any number of times.

- b To activate redial:
 - (1) Lift handset;
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 16.

The stored number will be redialled automatically

- 8. <u>10 Party Teams.</u> Extension users in a 10 party team may initiate calls to one another by means of abbreviated dialling. Each member within the team is allocated a number from 1 to 0. These numbers are referred to as 'Ordinal Numbers' and ringing any other member consists of dialling a code following by the Ordinal Number. To dial another member of your 10 party team:
- a. Lift handset;
- b. Await dial tone;
- c. Dial 15 plus selected Ordinal Number.

Although this facility involves dialling three digits to gain access to a four digit extension number, it requires the caller to remember only selected Ordinal Numbers. The locations have been provided in the Users Handbook for recording the other parties in your 10 party team (if applicable).

9. <u>Individual Abbreviated Dialling (IAD).</u> Users of extensions with this facility can store up to 10 Off-Base numbers on their handset and alter them at any time. Clearly, this is only applicable if the handset is allocated a COS of 2 or greater, and should be used for most commonly called numbers. Ten locations have been provided in the User Handbook for recording appropriate details of the telephone number stored for IAD by your handset (if applicable).

- a. To store a telephone number:
 - -(1) Lift handset;
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 108 plus a special Ordinal Number;
 - (4) A positive acknowledgment tone will be heard;
 - (5) Dial 0 (to achieve exchange line access) plus the number to be stored.
- b. To change the stored number:
- (1) Repeat above, entering the new telephone number to be stored onto the location (Ordinal Number) of the number to be changed.
- c. To dial a stored number:
 - (1) Lift handset;
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 18 plus the appropriate Ordinal Number;
 - (4) The stored number will be dialled automatically.
- 10. <u>Call Break In.</u> An authorised extension user or PABX Operator can intrude on another extension user in order to make a priority call. If wanted extension user terminates his call immediately, the connection (priority call) is set up automatically. If he does not, automatic call back will be initiated (Para 14):
- a. Lift handset;
- b. Await dial tone, if extension is busy;
- c. Push button;
- d. Dial 119.
- 11. <u>Call Diversion Fixed (CDF)</u>. Authorised extensions may instruct the telephone system to divert their calls to another pre-determined extension. The user to whom the calls have been diverted can also contact the diverted extension number, and outgoing calls can still be made from the diverted extension number while CDF is selected. On lifting the handset of an extension with CDF selected, the user will hear a non-standard dial tone to remind him that his calls are being diverted.
- a. To initiate CDF:
 - (1) Lift handset;
 - (2) Await dial tone;

- (3) Dial 14, receive positive acknowledge tone;
- (4) Replace handset
- b. To cancel CDF:
 - (1) Lift handset;
 - (2) Receive non-standard dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 104, receive positive acknowledgement tone;
 - (4) Replace handset

The fixed extension number to which calls will be diverted is pre-programmed into the telephone system, and can only be changed by application to the OIC GES.

- 12. <u>Call Diversion Variable (CDV)</u>. Extensions provided with this facility can have calls diverted to any other extension. The same operating conditions related to non-standard dial tone calls from the alternative extension to the diverted number apply as for CDF.
- a. To initiate CDV:
 - (1) Lift handset;
 - (2) Await dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 14 plus extension number to which calls are to be diverted;
 - (4) Replace handset;
- b. To cancel CDF:
 - (1) Lift handset;
 - (2) Receive non-standard dial tone;
 - (3) Dial 104, receive positive acknowledgment tone;
 - (4) Replace handset.

Note: Dialling 104 will cancel any diversions applied to an extension number whether fixed or variable.

- 13. <u>Call Diversion Follow Me.</u> All extension users with access to call diversion variable have this facility. Once authorised extension users have activated this facility from their handset, they may have calls diverted to any handset on Base without returning to their section. "Call Diversion Follow Me" occurs after a code has been dialled from the handset in your new location. If the user moves to another location this facility can be set up by the use of the "Follow Me" code. "Call Diversion Follow Me" can only be cancelled from the originating handset.
- a. To Initiate "Call Diversion Follow Me":

- (1) Originating Extension:
 - (1) Lift handset,
 - (2) Await dial tone,
 - (3) Dial 1165,
 - (4) Receive positive acknowledgement tone,
 - (5) Replace handset.
- (2) Destination Handset:
 - (1) Lift handset,
 - (2) Await dial tone,
 - (3) Dial 1163 plus original extension number,
 - (4) Replace handset.
- b. <u>To Cancel:</u>
 - (1) Lift original handset,
 - (2) Await non-standard dial tone,
 - (3) Dial 104
 - (4) Receive positive acknowledgment tone,
 - (5) Replace handset.
- 14. Automatic Call Back (ACB). By dialling a code, authorised extension users can initiate Automatic Call Back after successfully attempting to ring another extension. After ringing an engaged extension, then selecting ACB, a caller will be rung back (via a non-standard ring) once the called extension user has hung up. If this call is answered within 7 rings the called extension will be rung automatically. Otherwise, the ACB function will be cancelled without disturbing the called extension. Similarly, if a dialled extension is not answered selecting ACB will initiate an automatic call to the calling extension and then the called extension, once the handset of the latter has been lifted (signifying that the user has returned to the phone).
- a. To Initiate ACB (on any Decadic telephone):
 - (1) Dial 19,
 - (2) Receive positive acknowledgment tone,
 - (3) Replace handset.
- b. To Cancel ACB:

- (1) Lift handset,
- (2) Dial 109,
- (3) Replace handset.
- c. To Initiate ACB (on any Tone telephone):
 - (1) Press Transfer button or Recall button,
 - (2) Press * button (see Note below),
 - (3) Press 9,
 - (4) Replace handset.

NOTE: On some Tone telephones * button must be pressed twice.

- d. To Cancel ACB:
 - (1) Lift handset,
 - (2) Press # button (see Note below),
 - (3) Dial 9,
 - (4) Replace handset.

NOTE: On some Tone telephones # button must be pressed twice.

Only one other extension can be selected for ACB at one time but several extensions can select ACB for the same called extension. Extension users provided with off-base access who encounter engaged exchange lines (as distinct from an engaged telephone extension) can use ACB to be notified when a line becomes available.

- 15. <u>Three Way Conversation</u>. This facility enables one other party to be included in an existing telephone call, either by the calling or the called party. Note that no more than one off-base caller may be included in a Conference Call.
- a. To set up a Conference during an existing conversation:
 - (1) Press Facility Button,
 - (2) Await dial tone,
 - (3) Dial number of third party.
 - (4) Press Facility button and dial 13.

All three parties may now speak to each other. Invited parties to the conference may withdraw at any time by hanging up.

b. To Cancel a Conference Call:

(1) Press Facility Button (third party is terminated).

16. Five Way Conference.

This type of call can only be set up from an extension fitted with a Siemens Comfortset. Extension users of these types of handsets my invite up to three other parties to join an existing external or internal call. As for the Three Way Conference only one off-base caller may be included in the conference, and invited parties may hang up at any time.

- a. To set up a Conference:
 - (1) Lift handset,
 - (2) Dial 56,
 - (3) Conference tone 6 to 8 seconds,
 - (4) Press facility button,
 - (5) Await dial tone,
 - (6) Dial desired number,
 - (7) Party answers.
- b. Next party:
 - (1) Press Facility button,
 - (2) Three clicks of tone,
 - (3) Await dial tone.
 - (4) Dial 56,
 - (5) Press Facility button
 - (6) Receive positive acknowledgement tone (holding extension receives continuous conference tone),
 - (7) Await dial tone,
 - (8) Dial desired button,
 - (9) Party answers,
 - (10) Press Facility button.
- c. To connect all parties:
 - (1) Press Facility button,
 - (2) Dial 56,
 - (3) Press Facility button,
 - (4) Press # button.

Any party other than the originator may leave the conference at any time. If a party withdraws, 3 loud beeps will be heard. To end the conference, the originator hangs up.

- 17. <u>Divided Working (Alternating Between Inside and Outside Lines/Calls)</u>. Extension users can alternate between and extension user and a waiting internal or external party any number of times, with privacy being maintained between the two alternate parties. To initiate Divided Working once the initial call is in operation:
- a. Press Facility button,
- b. Dial desired extension,
- c. Extension answers,
- d. Dial 115,
- e. Divided Working is now available.

To alternate between lines press the Facility button.

- 18. <u>Call Pick Up.</u> Extension users can answer calls ringing on other extensions belonging to the same Call Pick Up Group, on their telephone. If an unattended extension in your pick-up group begins ringing, answer the call on your extension as follows:
- a. Lift handset,
- b. Dial 17,
- c. The call will be connected to your telephone.

If several telephones in your group are ringing simultaneously, this facility will connect you to them in the order they have rung.

- 19. <u>Feature Key Assisgnment Comfortset.</u> Feature keys are located on the right hand side of the handset. Reading from the top to the bottom the key features are as follows:
- a. Automatic Call Back (ACB),
- b. Automatic Redial,
- c. Call Diversion (Variable or Fixed),
- d. 10 Party Team Dialling

Although there are only 4 feature keys on these handsets, other features listed above may be operated by the use of the numeral keys on the handset, as previously described, and as detailed in your handbook.

MD110 EXTENSION USER

1827 Extension users at Attached Property Two (AP2) are now connected to a different PABX than the rest of RAAF Base Amberley. This PABX is connected to the base PABX by 12 tie lines which are carried over fibre optic cable. This has the following implications for extension users at AP2:

- a. A slight delay will be experienced by extension users between the time an on-base extension is dialled and when ring tone is heard.
- b. PABX facilities such as call diversion (follow me) and automatic call-back on busy are not available between AP2 and on-base extensions.
- 2. Calls may still be placed via the switchboard operator simply by dialling '9'. After booking your call you will be required to hang up and the operator will call you back when a connection has been made.

DNATS DIRECTORY

- DNATS is fully automatic telephone network, connecting Defence Establishments along the eastern seaboard. It enables calls to be connected without the standard STD call charge being applicable.
- 2. In order to fully utilise this system, DNATS must be used in preference to either Telecom STD or Trunk Line System for all calls between establishments.
- 3. It is important to remember at all times that DNATS is an insecure network and that classified subjects should not be discussed.
- 4. To connect the caller with the particular switchboard required, eg. to call the switchboard at HMAS Cerberus the caller would dial 8-579011 and then ask for the required extension.
- 5. The In-dial will provide a direct extension calling facility, eg. to contact 7188 at HMAS Cerberus the caller would dial 8-57-7188.
- 6. Should you at any times experience problems accessing these numbers contact the Switchboard Operator on '9'.
